I wrote my motivation letter for Debreceni Nyári Egyetem about the Hungarian word "hiányérzet," which alludes to the feeling that something is missing. I had used it to describe the realization that I had been experienceing "hiányérzet" until I said my first word in a foreign language. From that moment I was sure that I had understood the word, but I could not have been more wrong. From the moment I stepped off the plane I felt so welcomed in Hungary. I took phonetics, cooking, bike tours, and culture classes. I made friends with the Hungarian girls that were in charge of our program and I went into the city of Debrecen everyday with them to explore a new restaurant or try a new food.
